Celebrated journalists Nolan Finley and Stephen Henderson have been longtime friends, despite their different perspectives on pretty much everything. They founded the Civility Project in 2020 to teach people how to speak across divides, with practical tips and tactics they've learned and honed over nearly two decades of friendship.

Leadership Mindset – Dr. Suzanne Klein

Effective leadership can feel very complex as it requires a repertoire of skills as well as a mindset and behaviors that will motivate and inspire employees to follow. This workshop will focus on bringing the mindset for leadership (purpose, wisdom, growth, love and self-realization) as well as strategies for responding to unforeseen events.

Attendees will explore a new approach, leadership-in-flow, and the actions that can be taken to inspire peak performance in others. In addition, there will be discussion of a framework to react to the unexpected situations which typically consume over a third of a leader's time.

About the Presenters at the Superintendents' Retreat



Nolan Finley began his newspaper career as a copy boy at *The Detroit News* while a senior in college. After a brief stint with the *Jackson Citizen Patriot*, he returned to *The News* as a reporter, covering the administration of Mayor Coleman A. Young. He's been the newspaper's City Editor, Business Editor, Politics Editor and Deputy Managing Editor. In 2000, he was named Editorial Page Editor, where he directs the expression of the newspaper's editorial position on various national and local issues and writes a column in the Sunday newspaper. His columns have appeared in the newspaper ever since. As he wrote in his introductory column, Nolan is a product of *The News* and the Detroit community. He graduated from both <u>Schoolcraft</u> College and <u>Wayne State University</u> and in 2012 was inducted into the <u>Michigan</u> Journalism Hall of Fame. He is co-host of One Detroit on Detroit Public Television.



Stephen Henderson is an American journalist who won the 2014 Pulitzer Prize for commentary and the 2014 <u>National Association of Black Journalists</u> **Journalist** of the Year Award while writing for the *Detroit Free Press*. A native of Detroit, Stephen is a graduate of the <u>University of Detroit Jesuit High School</u> and the <u>University of Michigan</u>. Since 2015, he has been the host of <u>"Detroit Today" on WDET</u>. In 2020, he founded <u>BridgeDetroit</u>, where he serves as Executive Editor. He has worked for the <u>Baltimore Sun</u>, the <u>Chicago Tribune</u>, the <u>Lexington Herald-Leader</u> and <u>Knight Ridder</u>. Henderson is co-host of <u>One Detroit</u> and host of <u>American Black Journal</u> on <u>Detroit</u> Public Television.



Dr. C. Suzanne Klein is an Associate Professor in the Department of Organizational Leadership at Oakland University, Director of the OU Galileo Institute, and Coordinator of the Central Office Certificate Program in the School of Education and Human Services. Prior to joining the Oakland University faculty, she worked in the Grosse Pointe Public Schools as a teacher, school administrator, central office leader and over 14 years as its Superintendent.



Dr. Lynn Wietecha is currently serving as the Associate Vice President for Technology and Instructional Innovation at Lawrence Technological University. She is responsible for all LTU's technology systems and works with faculty to develop innovative courses that employ best practices in content delivery, assessment and engagement, both on and off-campus. Prior to joining LTU, Lynn was Technology Director at Dearborn Heights School District #7 where she started the Dearborn Heights Virtual Academy, one of the first completely online high schools in Michigan. Lynn has worked in the area of Instructional Design and Educational Technology for 20 years. It is her passion. She holds a Ph.D. in Instructional Design and Technology from Wayne State University where she was faculty for 10 years teaching graduate education courses in assessment, evaluation, and educational technology. Lynn has presented at ISTE, AECT and State level conferences and continues to research best practices in instructional design and technology.
